

Matthew 4:12-22 is a passage from the New Testament of the Bible that describes the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. In this passage, Jesus leaves his hometown of Nazareth and travels to the region of Galilee, where he begins to spread his message of repentance and the coming of the kingdom of God.
